At the September 17th meeting of the West Lorne Kiwanis club, guest speaker Ray Applebaum provided a presentation on community transportation. Ray serves as facilitator for the Community Transportation project, which is sponsored by the West Elgin Community Health Centre.

A broad range of community partners comprise the project steering committee: Victorian Order of Nurses; Canadian Cancer Society; Canadian Red Cross Society; Four Counties Transportation Service; Quad Counties Community Services; West Elgin Community Health Centre; Ministry of Health, Long-Term Care; and the Provincial Community Transportation Action Program, which provided project funding support.

The purpose of the project is to identify community transportation needs for residents in the Municipalities of West Elgin and Dutton-Dunwich; support available through formal and informal transportation services; and develop a network of accessible and coordinated transportation services to meet

the communities' needs.

Transportation provides us with the ability to maintain our independence. As we experience a large and growing aging population in Canada, many seniors are no longer able to drive themselves or access needed transportation to medical/specialized appointments, shopping, banking, social/recreation activities, church, etc.

In conversation with local residents, service providers, and elected officials, Ray has confirmed that the need for community transportation affects all age groups including children, youth, and seniors. We must also address the needs of: persons with a physical disability; persons who are developmentally challenged; and residents who speak a language other than English.

The steering committee is reviewing a report prepared by Ray, which summarizes the first phase of the project and provides recommendations for actions to be undertaken during Phase II of the project, which is planned to begin in October and continue to March, 1999.

During the question period, one

of the Cancer Society volunteer drivers mentioned that she "was in London recently at the hospital and found four other people in the waiting room who had driven from the West Elgin area that same day." It was recognized that the booking of appointments for a number of patients at the same time might be difficult, however, this example demonstrates the potential for improved coordination, wherever possible. Volunteer drivers are a scarce resource that we must recognize and nurture.

If you wish to learn more about community transportation and how you can get involved, attend the Skating & Corn Roast event to be held on Wednesday, September 30th. Skating from 2:00-3:30 p.m. at the Arena, followed by a barbecue from 4:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. There is no charge for this event and donations collected will go towards the Big Brothers/Big Sisters of St. Thomas-Elgin in support of the Big Bunch program for West Elgin.

Staddon receives motorcycle award

Doug Staddon, 36, son of Dorothy and Doug Staddon of RR2 West Lorne was recently awarded one of 11 International Competition Awards at the 1995 Canadian International Motorcycle Super Show held in Mississauga.

Bar Hodgson, Motorcycle Awards of Excellence director and show producer said that Staddon's award was based on his accomplishments in international competition last season.

Competing in the American Historic Racing Motorcycle Association (AHRMA) circuit last season, Staddon took seven first places and was sixth overall in the championship, which featured some 40 riders.



The body has been sent to Toronto to have dental records checked before determing that it was Lawrence Bruce Davey's body that was found in the car.







Mary recalls that at the time her husband passed away two years ago, the Centre was extremely helpful and supportive during this difficult period of her life. "I hear negative things in the community about the Centre and wish that people understood that the Centre can only do so much with what it has. The Centre has standards that must be met, the staff are really under a lot of pressure. A lot of people think that the Centre is a walk in clinic, which has never been the situation. As a client of the Community Health Centre, it is nice to know that they are only a phone call away if I should need them."
