


Outstanding Oratorical

Blast from the Past!


46th annual Skating Carnival



Members of the West Elgin Nature Club were busy this past year keeping track of the number and variety of birds in Elgin County. At their most recent meeting at the IOOF Hall in West Lorne they held its annual Christmas Bird County. Here, George Preiksaitis, left, Jennifer Newport and Bill Preiksaitis were kept busy assembling the returns. The bird count is for the local area only and 62 members took part. A total of 79 species were sighted, which is comparable to the previous four years. However, the total number of birds had declined from a 1996 record of 22,648 to the lowest count in five years - just 13,364.
