Quoting from a booklet prepared for the joyous dedication worship service are these beautiful words, "Our new church home represents the culmination of the consecrated efforts of our people, the fulfillment of our dream, the answer to our prayers. All Glory to God alone, Who has so graciously granted our petitions, put to shame our doubts and fears, blessed our labours, and permitted us to enter this new house of worship. Truly, the Lord hath done great

things for us, whereof we are indeed grateful. Not unto us, O Lord, but unto Thee be all the praise and the honour and the power and majesty forever."

Please join with us on Sunday, June 10, 2001, at 4 p.m. at 108 Graham Road, West Lorne to celebrate the 45th Anniversary of the dedication of our worship facility. East District President Rev. Al Maleske will be the guest preacher.

Following the worship service, a pot-blessed supper will be served. We give thanks to God for blessing us over the years and hope the past, present and future members will join with us on this day of celebration.

A special offering will be received on this day for our Lift Project, to make the building accessible to all people.

Fire destroys W. Lorne home

CAUSE WILL BE UNKNOWN **BECAUSE OF INTENSE** DAMAGE JULY

West Lorne and Rodney fire chiefs have said the house fire they faced last Tuesday was too advanced for them to be able to save it.

The home of Vern and Barb Humphrey, of Graham Road, outside the village of West Lorne was completely destroyed after a fire erupted and its speculated to have blazed for close to half and hour before bystanders and neighbours noticed smoke and firemen were called.

Andy Kieraszewicz, Rodney Fire Chief and incident commander said 'time' was against them as the blaze was already

too strong when the first West Lorne firefighters arrived shortly after 9:30 am. Rodney fire department arrived shortly aftewards with more men.

Kieraszwicz doubted a dozen more men would have helped the situation, because the fire had probably been going 20 minutes to half hour before neighbours noticed smoke coming from the building.

Kieraszewicz said he speculated the fire could have started in the utility room. The dryer had been used earlier that morning.

West Lorne fire chief Allan Beer said they will never know because of the total destruction of the fire.

The firefighters believe it quickly spread throughout entire house. Kieraszewicz said the fire then went up through the walls, into the ceiling and passed through every

To show that the people of Ontario care and are thinking of its neighbour, the Premier of Ontario has sent Books of remembrance to all MPP constituency offices across Ontario.

Residents will now be able to sign their names to these remembrance books that will available Monday (until Oct. 16) at the municipal offices of Southwold, Dutton/Dunwich West Elgin and also in the constituency office of Marcel Beaubien in Strathroy for those people in Southwest Middlesex.

The signed pages from all books will be bound and presented to the US government on behalf of the people of Ontario. Locally there will be a book for Elgin-Middlesex London and also a book for Lambton-Kent-Middlesex.

Helen Jones of Rodney has also started up a fund-raising campaign which will be sent to the American Red Cross. Jones said she felt she had to do something, and contacted the American Red Cross and the organization pleaded to her that money is desperately needed to pay for supplies for the many workers in New York still working in the rubble, looking for victims.

Many service clubs, churches and individuals have been rumoured to also be raising money towards the disaster relief and support the families who have been devastated by the tragedy.

One local man, Robbie Redman of St. Thomas, who is grandson of Ernie and Barb McFadden of Rodney, has returned from volunteering in New York as a medical assistant. His grandparents said they were concerned about Robbie going to New York during a dangerous time.

Storm causes damage in West Elgin

A late morning storm, followed by an afternoon storm on July 4 created havoc in the municipality of West Elgin. Fallen trees and debris were scattered in the first storm which hit prior to noon.

Traffic was temporarily haulted on Furnival Road heading south, Queen's Line between Rodney and West Lorne and on Highway 3 between the two communities in the early storm which came with heavy winds.

Some property was reported damaged by residents but there were no injuries. Numerous trees had to be cleaned up by municipal workers. In the community of West Lorne, the fire department was called in to clean up one fallen tree.

The worst news came later in the afternoon when a hail storm





New book remembers the history of Aldborough

The much anticipated book by West Lorne resident Harley Lashbrook on the history of Aldborough is now off the presses.

Lashbrook said he felt compelled to write the book in a effort to preserve the history of Aldborough. "I felt somebody had to do it," said Lashbrook.


Research, articles and material in the book dates back as far as the earliest days of Aldborough, including 1650 when the first settlement began when the Fleming family arrived and built a home on 1st Concession, Aldborough. Each community, school house, bridge, structure found through time is listed with stories and facts in "Aldborough-The Township with a Past"

The book itself is a collaboration of contributed articles and photos by interested parties who found out he was writing a book. In addition there is a tremendous amount of personal research, and also articles and photos from the archives of the old Rodney Mercury and West Lorne Sun newspapers, which the Lashbrook family, including Harley and his brother Lyn, owned and ran until the late 1980's.

Lashbrook said some of material in the book will be a real surprise for many readers as there are many pieces of information, even photographs of days and events, long forgotten.

Lashbrook said a lot of time and effort went into putting the book together and the expense of making it came out of his pocket.

West Elgin Mayor Duncan McPhail said he was very excited to be able to read it soon. McPhail proclaimed he had a 'soft spot' for local history and was looking

Storm creates havoc in region... but could have been worse

It was bad enough but it could have been a lot worse. That is the sentiment of many individuals, businesses and organizations after the ice storms of last Thursday January 31 and Friday February 1.

The communities of Southwold Township, Dutton/Dunwich and West Elgin all experienced power failures on Friday. Parts of West Lorne and Wallacetown were reported to have lost hydro for over 18 hours and still did not have electricity by late Friday night- *The Chronicle's* press time.

Hyrdo One officials could not be reached for comment on how long the electricity shortage would continue to be for the areas of Wallacetown and West Lorne.

Because of the power failure in West Lorne, (reported to be blown out transformers), Glencoe's water supply from the West Lorne reservoir was greatly affected. The reservoir which brings water to Southwest Middlesex, including Glencoe, is powered by a electric pump. By Friday afternoon, Southwest Middlesex had approached media to announce to residents to conserve their water usage. Water pressure was greatly decreasing by the hour. On Friday afternoon Southwest Middlesex Mayor Doug Reycraft said without the pump sending water to them, their containers would have emptied "within a dayand-a-half."

Reycraft also said it was a benefit that the public schools had

a P.A. day on Friday, because normally schools use a tremendous amount of water.

Later in the afternoon, Ontario Clean Water Agency had come to the rescue by donating the service of a generator to run the West Lorne reservoir.

Numerous trees were destroyed or damaged by accumulated ice and later strong winds on Thursday night and Friday morning. West Elgin Roads Superintendent Rick Jackson confirmed the worst areas were along Lake Erie. He said his employees were working steady on Thursday night clearing debris along the sideroads.

Dutton/Dunwich assistant Roads Superintendent Kevin Englehart confirmed there was a lot of cleanup to be made in the Wallacetown area after the storms.

Elgin OPP reported a large increase in police calls on Thursday. OPP community service officer Dennis Harwood said on an average day there are 37 calls but last Thursday there were 68. Harwood said of that there were 10 calls made based on dangerous road conditions, with debris,

etc; two calls were made of fallen hydro wires; 20 calls were made on collisions and 10 calls were for police assistance for example- car breaking down or spinning off road.

Harwood said people should remind themselves of how dangerous it is to be driving on potentially dangerous roads, during what he calls "Nasty Evil Weather Systems." He said people should think twice about driving in the conditions and whether it is such an important risk to take, or not. If it isn't, Harwood said the easiest and safest choice to make is stay at home where it is safe.

Overall most officials were glad it was not a lot worse than it was. For example, the Simcoe area was hit hard by this storm and was still reeling from the damage on the weekend.

Some of the officials noted that the temperature and weather of January 31

changed at the right time before m a j o r d a m a g e could be done. Jackson

said many of the trees were showing signs of being too heavy with ice and also some power lines. Hours later the weather had turned warmer with rain, which saved a lot to them. Had the weather not changed there would have been problems, according to Jackson.

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"It would have been a disaster for sure," said Jackson. "There would a lot trees down and a lot of roads would have been closed."


Closing the show, and bringing us "back to the future" is John's innovative BLACK HOLE illusion ... where John partially disappears and then re-emerges from a void space.

401crash kills London woman



By Wednesday afternoon both westbound 401 traffic and eastbound traffic were detoured onto the Emergency Detour Route through West Lorne after a fatal collision on the major highway. Rubbernecking and gawking while driving was also a problem the OPP and other emergency response personnel noticed.



Two OPP officers assisted in West Lorne in the detouring 401 traffic going through Graham Road at Pioneer Line and enabling the trucks and cars to move as quickly as possible.



OPP ask for better driving during accidents

What began as a routine clean-up of a transport accident on 401 last week turned into tragedy as impatient and onlooking drivers jeopardized the health and safety of others on the major highway during the clean up attempts.

A London woman is dead following a chain of events on Wednesday on the 401, and a Brampton man is facing charges related to her death.

Margaret Budden, 66 years old of London was killed in a collision one kilometre east of the Currie Road off ramp. The traffic at the time was slow due to a normal detour to take transports out of the ditch.

Elgin OPP later arrested and charged Rajinder Singh Jutla, 38 years old of Brampton with one count of Criminal Negligence Causing Death in connection to Budden's fatal crash.

At 10 am on Wednesday, the OPP and roadside crews closed a section of the westbound 401 between Currie Road in Dutton/Dunwich and Graham Road in West Elgin.

Two transport trucks and trailers had to be removed from the ditch when they left the road the night before. Both units slid off the road in the icy conditions of Tuesday Iona Road and Currie Road in Dutton/Dunwich.

By noon Elgin OPP confirmed the accident took the life of one person. The collision involved 10 vehicles - four passenger vehicles, one cube van and five transport trucks and trailers.

In the afternoon OPP announced to media that emergency personnel were facing problems with eastbound traffic. The eastbound drivers were "rubbernecking and slowing to look at the collision scene. The OPP announced media to pass onto the drivers to continue driving and keep their eyes on the road.

OPP decided to then close the eastbound lanes from Graham Road to Iona Road.

Traffic was rerouted using the Emergency Detour Route section that went through West Lorne and turned onto Highway 3 at Eagle. From there the 401 traffic went to Iona were it was directed onto County Road 14 which brought them back to the 401.

By 2:30 pm, OPP were investigating two separate collisions which caused the closure of the *eastbound* 401.

Elgin OPP community service officer Dennis Harwood warned about the bad practice of 'gawking' or

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Krzyworaczka charged with attempted murder

Additional charges have been laid in connection with the April 26 shooting of a 43-year-old female in West Lorne.

Mike Krzyworaczka, 35, of West Lorne, was charged last Wednesday with Attempted Murder following an investigation by the Elgin County OPP Crime Unit. He was also charged with one count of point firearm, one count of discharge firearm with intent to endanger life.

The victim, a 43 year old woman from London has been released from hospital.

Elgin OPP will not identify her name as part of police policy to protect victims of domestic violence.

Krzyworaczka has been in custody since he was initially charged at the end of April with: • 12 counts of Possessing a

firearm while prohibited;

10 counts of unsafe storage
1 count breach probation

· 2 counts possessing an

explosive substance
2 counts of production of a controlled substance

 2 counts of possession of a controlled substance

On April 26, 2002, Elgin County OPP officers responded to a 911 call at a residence on the Pioneer Line in West Lorne and located the accused's girlfriend suffering from a single gunshot wound to her abdomen. She was hospitalized at the London Health Sciences Centre for three weeks as a result of her injury.

Krzyworaczka appeared Wednesday in St Thomas Court where he was formally charged with the additional offences. He was remanded until June 3 2002 to answer to all charges.

Detective Inspector Dave Cardwell of the OPP Investigation Bureau, Criminal Investigation Branch (C.I.B.) is in charge of the investigation. JUNE 3/02

Tragedy struck at approximately 10:18 am when a serious collision took place on the westbound 401 between is an accident in the other lanes.



Think twice before lighting that match in Western Elgin and South Middlesex.

Local fire departments say the ground is too dry and it would not take long for a simple grass fire to spread and become a serious problem.

All fire chiefs in *The Chronicle* readership area have called for a zero allowance for burning policy.

Mischief in the Township of Southwold Elgin County OPP and Southwold Volunteer Fire Department were kept busy last Monday, September 2 in the Shedden area.

During a one hour time frame, five grass fires were located in isolated rural areas at the side of roadways. These fires formed a "U" shape pattern around the Shedden area.

All the fires were extinguished by the Southwold firefighters without incident. OPP are asking for the public's assistance in obtaining any information on who may have started these fires. Call Elgin OPP at 631-2929 or call Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477).

Fire Chief John Brown reiterated to the public and media on Wednesday that they need to be very cautious around the dry grass. He said it can ignite very easily and quickly engulf entire areas.

Fire departments are pleading to motorists to not flick their cigarette

butts out their vehicle windows and to instead use their ashtrays.

By the end of last week every fire department was showing zero tolerance burning anywhere in the municipalities.

This is the first time it has ever been recorded that fire departments in the municipalities of Newbury, Southwest Middlesex, West Elgin, Dutton/Dunwich, Southwold, Central Elgin and Malahide have issued zero burn policies at the same time.

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
