Jesse's Journey sets new goal with students help

John Davidson came to West Elgin Secondary with the latest goal for Jesse's Journey - but it can only succeed with the help of WESS students

In 1989 John pushed his son Jesse, more than 3,300 kilometres across Ontario and raised \$1.5 million as a result of their campaign to raise money for their organization -Foundation for Gene and Cell Therapy:

Later that year they went on a 286 day, 8300 kilometre trek across Canada to raise national awareness. This time they raised \$2 million for gene research.

Jesse, who is almost 22 years old suffers from Muscular Duchenne Dystrophy. He continues to be an inspiration by participating and taking on large tasks in life.

"He is still going at it. He is still taking part and making things happen," John Davidson confirmed for WESS students last week.

Jesse will be graduating this year from Fanshawe College with a diploma in Hotel Management.

Davidson came to WESS to set the new goal for the Foundation for Gene and Cell Therapy is setting a challenge for 320 schools and 500,000 across Ontario to spend one day having fun and raising money for

According to Davidson, the sky is truly the limit for the WESS students to come up with a fundraiser on Friday. He expects the students will come up with something very


"When you let people run with an idea, they get very innovative," said Davidson.

Davidson told the WESS students they need to set goals in life but also make personal evaluations.

"You need to do an inventory of your life. You need to look at yourself in the mirror and ask yourself: 'What really matters in life," said Davidson.

He also pointed out that if you locate what is truly important, other things don't seem to matter or have the same worth.

"Sometimes we get our priorities mixed up," said Davidson when pointing out that sports athletes are making millions while true heroes who

work diligently with volunteer time, work and dedication, are not always seen in the same light.

After his talk Davidson told The Chronicle that in Canada focus shifted with one important young man.

"Terry Fox set the standard," Davidson admitted. Since Fox, Davidson said Canada has been capable of seeing heroes as people who make a difference.

Davidson said south of the border, in the United States. people have tried similar campaigns like Terry Fox's campaign or Jesse's

Journey, but have failed because the US fails to focus on the issue at hand.

"In Canada we are good at seperating the wheat from the chaff," remarked Davidson.

He said Canadians have an easier time understanding the issue rather than someone's personal challenge.

Is it growing yet?



Elgin schools threatened by closure formula

PRINCIPAL SCHNEIDER PUTTING OUT FIRES

West Elgin Secondary School principal Larry Schneider was busy last week answering phone calls from irate parents thinking the school is slated for closure.

Schneider said a media report earlier in the week caused unnecessary furore. He pointed out a story in the St. Thomas paper that alluded to both Arthur Voaden and West Elgin facing an uncertain future.

The schools do not qualify for the minimum of 909 full-timeequivalent students the Ministry of Education has set for Thames Valley District School Board secondary schools.

The information came from a May 27 Thames Valley District School Board special information meeting with 300 school administrators and parent representatives. The meeting came about because the school board faced criticism for making budget decisions without proper consultation.

Schneider attended the meeting and was critical about the fact that WESS was not mentioned in the entire meeting

and called the furore unnecessary and premature.

Elgin trustee Linda Stevenson, who shares the former Elgin board territory with David Steward, said all Elgin schools will be looked at with an accommodation study in 2003, except for one - East Elgin Secondary School. Stevenson said this fact alone lets the public know they should be concerned about school closures.

Stevenson does not like the fact that the province is looking at a "one size fits all formula," which affects the majority of rural schools. She said if the board were to listen to the province, schools like WESS and all other Elgin schools except EESS would be closed, because they do not have enough students.

Although she understood the feelings of Schneider, Stevenson feels it is no time to be complacent.

"Is it time to panic? I think they should be and should have been panicking for a while before this," said Stevenson.

The Elgin trustee said it is also due time to review the TVDSB itself and questioned its efficiency.

Age: 18


Grade: OAC


