History preserved Bound editions of old newspapers made available to local libraries

With the help of a \$5,000 Trillium Foundation grant through the West Kiwanis Club, Lorne Harley Lashbrook's collection of old newspapers are now in bound editions in the West Lorne and Rodney libraries

"I kept copies of all the old newspapers," said Lashbrook, whose family became owners of some of the original newspaper operations in the area.

His father, Ernest bought the the West Elgin Sun in 1921. The newspaper eventually became the West Lorne Sun and he also bought the Rodney Mercury.

Lashbrook's brother. Lynn, became the owner and editor of the paper and in 1947, Harley joined the staff.

"I started as just a joeboy around the place," he said.

He retired 14 years ago as the assistant editor but not before collecting decades worth of the publications.

The Mercury and Sun changed hands a few times in the 80s and early to mid-90s when they were merged into The Mercury Sun before closing down.

"I wanted them to be preserved forever," said Lashbrook, knowing how much local history is contained in those pages. Both he and his wife have written books about the area with research coming from those publications.


His wife, Nancy, wrote Aldborough: The Township with a Past, and he wrote, West Lorne: 90 Years a Village, which included much information found within the pages of the newspaper.

Working with the Kiwanis Club, he was able to receive a Trillium grant to have the papers bound in a format that will make the history in those pages available to anyone.

There are 110 bound books produced, dating back to 1949. the bulk of the books will go to the West Lorne library which

The guest speaker for the evening was Christine Dennis of Tillsonburg. Dennis has a Bachelor of Science in Herbal Medicine, and is working on her master's degree.

She is one of only 12 people, in North America, with this type of accreditation. Dennis is a "medical herbalist", working closely with a medical physician, to treat people with a variety of disorders. Dennis believes in the medicinal and edible qualities of common garden weeds, flowers, and herbs. Her motto is; " If you can't beat them, eat them!".

Some common garden weeds,and their abilities are: Mustard- seed pods are good in salads; good for circulatory system.

Stinging Nettle- very high in nutrients; seeds help you adapt to stress, roots are good for prostate problems(handle this plant very carefully; use heavy gloves).

Dandelion- flowers and leaves are good in salads (high in potassium and calcium); roots can be ground up and used as a coffee substitute.

Chickweed- very nutritious; leaves can be put into bathwater, to relieve eczema.

Motherwort- excellent for menopausal, and other hormonal symptoms.

Echinacea- well known cold fighter.

Lemon Balm- has anti-viral properties; good for cold sores.

Lavender- used as a tea, it has relaxing qualities.

Dennis holds workshops, at her Tillsonburg home, which she and her husband have named "Little Nettle Herb Farm".

Horticultural society learning about life in Southwestern Ontario's Carolinian forests

Mathis Natvik, of Orford Ridges Nursery, was the guest speaker, at the West Lome and Community Horticultural Society's general meeting.

Natvik, with a Bachelor of Science degree in Ecology, spoke to the society's members and visitors about the "Native Plant Community in Southwestern Ontario".

Natvik's slide presentation and discussion educated the audience, and taught us that southwestern Ontario wasn't completely covered with trees- there were also savannahs and prairies: savannahs have 25 per cent tree cover, and prairies are treeless. If you were to draw a line from Grand Bend to Toronto, the area to the south of that line, in Ontario, is known as the Carolinian Life Zone. It is also known as the eastern deciduous forest area.

This area has a more diverse variety of plant species, wildlife, and insects than almost any other area in North America, and is a merging area for many ecosystems.

Southwestern Ontario has 10 per cent of its natural habitat remaining, Elgin County has 10-11 per cent coverage, and Natvik's home county of Chatham-Kent has only three per cent of natural habitat left.

That is the lowest coverage in southwestern Ontario. Natvik feels that people should become more vocal in preserving the environment, and he recommends supporting the Nature Conservancy of Canada, if you feel the same as he. Natvik was also involved in the preservation of the Clear Creek forest, near Duart. His nursery business keeps him busy, as a wholesale supplier to businesses and governments all over North America.

He specializes in native trees, shrubs, wildflowers, and grasses. Susan Lilley thanked Natvik, for his presentation, and presented him with a parting gift. Members and visitors then enjoyed refreshments, from a table decorated with a Spring theme.

Members are reminded of the Garden Fair, on May 10, at 196 Graham Road, West Lorne (Nancy Baillie's). If you have any plants, in your garden, that need a new home or dividing, pot them up and bring them to the plant sale. Lawnbowling club to get lights with some help from council

The West Elgin Lawnbowling Club will be seeing the light real soon – the light of \$15,000 in new lighting for the currently dark greens.

West Elgin Council approved a \$6,000 donation to the club that will allow it to use a \$6,000 Trillium Foundation grant toward the lighting project. "The lighting is the worst. Some come on. Some don't," said Joan Lashbrook, club president, at council's Aug. 14 meeting. "I think it's a good investment in the community," said Deputy Mayor Graham Warwick. "If we can provide more lights, that will let them bring more people to town." Lashbrook said last week, club members have to pack it in by 8:30 p.m. because it's too dark to play but that proper lighting would allow them to extend their season into October and offer evening play and night tournaments to increase the activity at the club. Tournaments attract players from across

Ontario but the club is currently limited to daytime tournaments in a shorter season.

Right now, the club's biggest needs are lighting and new gutters around the greens that keep the balls in place.

While they originally were hoping for a \$35,000 Trillium After that, she said the club has no major needs it can't look after through its membership and money raised through hosting tournaments, more of which they will be able to operate with the new lighting.

Warwick said in the past, council has found it's wise to invest in volun-

The 2003-2004 Board is: Tom Jones - President; Ted Uffen - Vice President; Irene Puddester - Secretary; Mary Bodnar - Treasurer; Robert White; Keith Fretter; Jeff Knight; John Eagleson - Directors.

The evening ended with thanks to those members of the chamber that generously sponsored the refreshments and the meeting facilities. Foundation grant to make some other improvements to the park, the foundation approved \$6,000 for new gutters.

The foundation didn't understand the priority of lighting in the club's application.

However, Lashbrook said they approached the foundation and appealed to it to allow them to use the money for lighting. They reached an agreement that, if the club could match the \$6,000 and have work started by Oct.1, the money could go toward lighting.

The work will cost about \$15,000. Lashbrook said the club has enough to cover the rest but needed \$6,000 in a hurry to be able to get the grant-use changed.

She said they would reapply next year for the gutters. AuG/03

While council's budget is set, work on grandstand upgrades is expected to come in under budget, leaving extra room to make the donation.

Lashbrook thanked council for its support and said, "Please come and play with us one night."

West Lorne Horticultural Society learns from biologist about using edible plants

The West Lorne and Community Horticultural Society returned to action, after a summer hiatus, with guest speaker Jennifer Grant, of the Lambeth Horticultural Society, discussing "Edible Plants: A New Kind of Salad".

Grant is also the Assistant Director for Middlesex, in District 10, and a busy Master Gardener.

She is also a biologist, and is keenly interested in edible plants, whether they be flowers, herbs, or weeds.

As Grant explained to our group, when our country was being settled, many of the people new to Canada brought with them medicinal plants, since they were unsure of what they would find in this unknown country.

Plantain was a popular plant, used as a poultice to heal infected wounds. Mint was good for digestion, and lemon balm was used to treat headaches. Many times, a person's life would depend on the availability of medicinal plants, and the skill of the women, who were responsible for learning how to use these plants.

Other examples of edible plants are: chives, garlic, borage, thyme, oregano, and sage, all herbs used to flavour our food; calendulas, carnations, roses. nasturtiums, violets, and day lilies, all flowers used enhance salads; to chickweed, purslane, cattails, red-rooted pigweed, lamb's quarters, and milkweed, all weeds used as a food, first by the settlers, and more recently
