Meanwhile the Institute had been raising funds by means of card parties and travelling baskets, and a canvas of interested families was conducted which brought in a total of \$175.00, (the Greer family of Sparta donating \$30.00).

In the Spring of 1962 Mr. Oscar Temple, a cement contractor of St. Thomas, was engaged to build the enclosure to contain the stones. Every stone in good enough condition was incorporated into the memorial, with the large stones placed on a cement floor in the centre of the enclosure. St. James Church provided the cornerstone (8x16x2) which read: "Site of Kilmartin Church, 1838-1905, restored 1962". A cement walk was laid to the fence facing the Yarmouth Centre road, with the marble posts which formerly enclosed the Buchanan plot placed along each side of the walk. Work was completed by June 14, 1962, and in the fall the plot was seeded and a garden gate placed in the fence opening leading to the walkway.

In May of 1963 some landscaping consisting of six evergreens and sixty privet were planted around the enclosure and the committee were asked to make plans for the dedication of the memorial. Mrs. Julien G. Martin was now a member of the cemetery committee as she had succeeded Mrs. John Penhale as president of the W. I.

The dedication ceremony took place on the afternoon of June 23, 1963, on the occasion of the observance of Kilmartin-St. James 125th Anniversary. The program opened with the singing of "O Canada" followed by the introduction of the official representatives: Mr. J. A. McBain M.P., Mr. R. K. McNeil M.P.P., the Reeve of Yarmouth, Mr. Mason Tansley, and Mrs. Vermont Pow, substituting for Mrs. J. D. Galbraith, President of Elgin County W. I. A history of the cemetery was read by Mrs. Ferguson Campbell. The dedication and prayers were given by Rev. W. A. Kincaid, minister of St. James Church. A hymn "Faith of our Fathers" was sung, and the singing of "The Queen" closed the impressive ceremony.

The cemetery is the responsibility of the Yarmouth Glen W. I. The township grants of \$50.00 yearly pay for the upkeep of the cemetery and the mowing of the grass. In 1966 a further donation of \$15.00 was received from Clare Greer of Sparta. Also in 1966, as a Centennial project, a purple beech and two flowering crabs were planted on the grounds.

In regard to the up-keep of cemeteries of which there is no owner, at the East Elgin District Annual, May 26, 1953, the Federated Women's Institute Board gave the information that these cemeteries are the legal responsibility of the Municipal Councils and the local Women's Institute should contact the council regarding needed improvement.

HISTORY OF YARMOUTH CENTRE UNITED CHURCH

For Centennial Sunday, October 29, 1967.

This centennial year, marking the one hundredth birthday of Canada, has been a time of great rejoicing for us Canadians as we reflect on how wonderful it is to live in a country, our homeland, for a whole century. Locally, we have an added beautiful experience in that our church has roots even deeper than those of the Dominion of Canada.

Let us go back to the "Mother Methodist Church" of this vicinity where grand-parents and great-grandparents of some of the present congregation worshipped and took communion. 1836 is the earliest record we have of Methodist work here, when St. Thomas circuit had Sparta, Port Stanley, Union and Townline, with ministers Ames, Clark, Warner and Starr. At the end of the latter's pastorate in 1871, the country charges were detached, and at a conference in Belleville, a Yarmouth circuit was arranged, composed of Talbot Road Church (Yarmouth Centre had not yet been named), Townline, Salt Creek (the site of which on Radio Road near the 10th concession is now marked only by a well-preserved pioneer cemetery) and Legg's Appointment in Westminster Township. Rev. Wm. Hadwin was pastor, residing at the Yarmouth appointment in the house which was the home of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Taylor (Parents of Mrs. Chester Gloin.)

The church, a frame building was on the west side of the Tower Road (the side-road leading to the railroad crossing), a few rods north of the Talbot Road. In 1873 Rev. George Madden came to this charge, and at this time the first Sunday School was organized with Donald McIntyre, Sr., Supt. A little later, he was replaced by Mr. George Newcombe, for whom, with his devoted wife (afterwards first president of the Ladies' Aid) was dedicated one of the beautiful memorial windows which adorns our present church.

In 1875, at a conference in Brantford, the circuit was again changed, making Sparta the residential point of the new minister, Rev. J. A. Stonehouse, with Yarmouth, Orwell, Salt Creek and Port Bruce attached.

In 1883 the Yarmouth charge felt keenly that theirs was not a suitable place of worship and set about erecting a church which better reflected their thanks for so many blessings. The building was moved to the corner of the Talbot Road, and sided with white brick, stained glass windows were added, and a choir loft behind the pulpit. Formerly the choir had occupied one of the corners nearest the door, and at one time was led by a precentor with a tuning fork. About this time, the first Ladies' Aid was organized, with Mrs. Newcombe president and Mrs. Wm. Heydon (Mrs. Huntley's mother) secretary. One of their early work assignments was the making of the church seat cushions still in use some 75 years later.

By now, Rev. Joseph Philip was in charge and the circuit was 3-point. Minimum salaries were undreamed of, and budget arrangements are interesting: Salary \$300; Board #250; Fuel \$50; Horse keep \$60; Moving expense \$21.60; Children's keep \$66.65; and incidentals \$2. Of this amount, Yarmouth Centre's share was \$282. Until 1886, collections were in charge of the "Class leaders" and were handed in quarterly as Brother Shepherds family's contributions, but not until Mr. Graham's pastorate in 1901 were there printed financial statements. About 1906 another beautiful memorial window was given by James, Walter and George Westlake and their sister Mrs. Wm. Paddon, for their mother, Mrs. Mary Ann Westlake. A few years later, another window in memory of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Ross (grandparents of Dayton Mills) was presented by their family. Mr. Ross was a long-time Sunday School Supt., and Mrs Ross and Mrs. Archibald Palmer were the outstanding Sunday School teachers of the very little folk of that time. One of the earliest memories of church attendance of this writer was the perfect attendance of the paternal grandparents of Dayton Mills, Mr. and Mrs. George Mills. Mr. Mills, totally deaf, never heard a sermon or music, but he apparently heard God and the angel choir and knew church was the place to commune. Two other lovely old couples, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Balkwell and Mr. and Mrs. Small (grandparents of Clarence and Granville Gloin), were always present in the front rows and always knelt for prayer. And could we forget the McIntyre family, the Misses Kate and Belle and their brother? Miss Kate has passed on within this decade after having celebrated her 100th birthday.
