The purpose of this report is to provide the Elgin Group Police Services Board with a summary of the 2022 Ontario Association of Police Services Boards (OAPSB) Spring Conference.

DISCUSSION:

May 26, 2022

Modernizing Police Governance in Ontario

Ryan Teschner, Executive Director and Chief of Staff at Toronto Police Services Board

Danielle Dowdy, Senior Advisor, Strategic Policy & Stakeholder Relations

Dubi Kanengisser, Senior Advisor, Strategic Police & Stakeholder Relations

This session looked at how different interpretations of the Board's role has impacted the Toronto Police Services Board.

Key Points

- Building trust through modern police governance: "Trust seems to be the secret sauce."
 - Public trust is at a historic low; boards must deliberately seek trust.
 - Healthy Tension or Symbiosis?
 - There have been decades of misunderstanding of what police boards are.
-

- By building trust with our police service boards and our chiefs, boards will be able to do their job.
- Boards must enhance transparency and public understanding of the work of governance. Good governance needs to be properly resourced.
- Anti-Racism Advisor Panel, and Mental Health & Addictions Advisory Panels have been implemented.
- They are revising existing policies, including policies on body worn cameras and artificial intelligence.

Leading with Priorities, Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Anti-Racism

Stephen Reid, Co-Chair Serving with Pride

Jacqueline Edwards, President, Association of Black Law Enforcers

Tammy Fryer, Chair, A WIP-ON (WE in Policing)

Kimberley O'Toole, President, Ontario Women in Law Enforcement

This was an in-depth conversation about how legislation and regulatory frameworks require Police Service Boards to take a more active role ensuring that robust diversity, equity, and inclusion (EDI) and anti-racism strategies for all of Ontario's police services are implemented and measured.

Key points

- Panel put out 600 surveys and only received 10 responses. This shows there is more apathy than anticipated.
- Why did they only receive 10 responses to the survey? Was it miscommunication, or did people not know how to answer the questions?
- Discussed when to consult and engage, who should be engaged and how engagement can be sustained.
- Communities both internally and externally are saying enough is enough of being used.
- The morale internally and externally is at a low, partly due to COVID.
- It is important that boards walk the walk and talk the talk.
- Members need to feel safe, physically and psychologically. They have to believe things are going to be done. For the past 25 years, we have been having the same discussion, but nothing is changing.
- Your EDI strategy needs to reflect your organization.
- Are we getting the real reasons why chiefs are leaving and retiring early?

#HTinWC and #SAinWC: Raising Awareness in Rural Communities

Sarah Bowers-Peter, Program Coordinator, Crime Stoppers Guelph Wellington*

Wellington County received a one-year Community Safety and Policing Grant to raise awareness and reduce the stigma surrounding human trafficking and sexual assault as well as providing training to officers on trauma-informed approaches.

Key points

- They produced a video.
- The system re-traumatizes victims.
- Human trafficking is hard to measure as most cases go unreported.
- Rural locations are ideal for recruitment.
- The internet is a key resource for grooming.
- On average it takes a predator 35 seconds to contact a victim once the profile is created.

Policing 2023 and Beyond

Chief Nishan Duraipah, Vice President, Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police*

This session looked at critical issues facing policing today and into the future.

Key Points

- Special Constables are being considered. These constables do not have to be scrutinized by special agencies.
- The proper use of these Constables will free up sworn officers.
- Cyber related crime, human trafficking, and community safety and well-being planning are heavily police-driven, but the goal is to regress out of it.
- Police are seeing more success with the mobile response teams.
- The OPP is short 800-1000 officers right now.
- Governments don't enact change. Governments react to change.
- Police mandate was to serve and protect. Now we are social workers and health counselors.
- Police boards have been asked to sharpen their pencils. While cybercrimes and human trafficking are increasing, our resources are decreasing.
- Provincial government has set aside \$45 million over 3 years for mental health.

- Technology makes policing more effective (e.g. electronic note taking, phones for referrals while in the home).
- With body worn cameras, the perception of the public is that there will be increased accountability and transparency of the officers.

OPP Stakeholder Survey – Detachment Performance Reporting

Introduction and background on the upcoming OPP survey in response to the Office of the Auditor General of Ontario Value Money Audit

Key Points

- The purpose of the survey is to gather stakeholder input on what metrics/ information may be most meaningful to support the development of goals and objectives for decision making.
- The survey goal is to standardize metrics/information reported.
- Recommended that the survey help the municipalities receive adequate and effective level of policing service, to increase transparency and provide municipalities with the information required to make informed decisions.
- Reporting objectives and compliance with yet to come into force legislation:
 - enhanced transparency and accountability
 - enhanced reporting based on needs identified
 - enhanced governance stakeholder satisfaction with OPP
 - enhanced evidence-based decision making
- Five standardized themes derived from the PSA to help PSB's set goals and objectives
 1. Crime Prevention and Community Engagement
 2. Law Enforcement
 3. Assistance to Victims of crime
 4. Police Resources
 5. Trust and Confidence in Police

Keynote Address

Fueling Success Through Inclusivity and Diversity

Dr. Ivan Joseph

Practical and proven strategies to build an inclusive culture

Key Points

- Teams with more diversity and inclusivity have higher performance rates.
- High performance of excellence happens because it forces you to work, express your views and expertise. Diverse teams will outperform teams of similar interests.
- We have bias that diverse teams make conflict.
- Limit referral hiring. You are 79 times more likely to hire a female if you have 2 more in the pool.
- Focus beyond task adhesions and focus on social cohesion.
- Don't treat everyone the same. Treat everyone equitably and celebrate their differences.
- Make people feel like they matter and belong.
- You cannot make diversity training mandatory; you need to figure out a way to make it interesting.

Cannabis Act

Rachel Huggings, Deputy Director, Executive Lead, Cannabis Legalization

Provincial Police talked about their recent projects looking at illegal cannabis products and the harmful contaminants. They also discussed the need for broader collaboration between regulators, law enforcement and public health when communicating with Canadians about the potential risks of illegal cannabis.

Key points

- Most illegal productions are gone except for Toronto.
- Ontario has about 400 legal entities producing cannabis. There are over 800 in the whole Country, and Ontario has half of them.
- Medical Cannabis – when they created the Cannabis Act it was too much work in such a short time, so they kept the act the way it was.
- OPP and Quebec are the only 2 that have a provincial team to enforce cannabis. There are 24 members on the team. Half are civilian and half are police officers.
- Police cannot do everything related to cannabis enforcement. They handle the large organizations.
- They do not even touch the low hanging fruit; they want the ones linked to organized crimes.
- The US is up 518% of seizures.
- A lot of doctors are prescribing high doses of cannabis. The average person would consume 3.2 grams a day. Doctors are prescribing 45 – 100 grams a day.
- If a doctor prescribes 100 grams, they will get a call from Health Canada.

- Trying to get national guidelines on setting prescription limits.

Election Outcomes and the Effects on Policing

Lynne Hamilton, Local Consultants

Lynne gave an update on the state of the election race and what the outcome could mean for police boards going forward.

Key points

- Her prediction was a Conservative majority government. This should not impact the police boards.
- Potential new SOLGEN Minister – Mulroney, Romano, Mark Saunders?
- Continued partnership and support
- New police service act to go forward quickly (2023 implementation)
- Resources for training
- Continued great relations with OAPSB
- Possible name change of the OAPSB

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the report from the Secretary-Administrator, dated August 30, 2022, be received and filed.

INTRODUCTION:

The purpose of this report is to provide the Elgin Group Police Services Board with an update regarding a recent request from the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) for an extension to the current contract.

DISCUSSION:

Elgin's contract with Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) expires on December 31, 2022. OPP asked member municipalities to consider extending our current contract to December 31st, 2023. To support member municipalities in their consideration of this matter, the following was sent to each municipality on July 21, 2022:

- Letter from Chair Martyn with details about the proposed contract extension (Municipality of Dutton Dunwich attached as an example);
- Draft By-Law (prepared by the Secretary-Administrator of the Elgin Group PSB and reviewed by the County Solicitor); and
- A draft of the Amending Agreement sent to our group by OPP.

The agreement will conclude at the end of 2023 or when the Community Safety and Policing Act comes into force.

**CONCLUSION:**

An update regarding the Elgin Group PSB contract with OPP and the Community Safety and Policing Act will be provided at a future meeting.

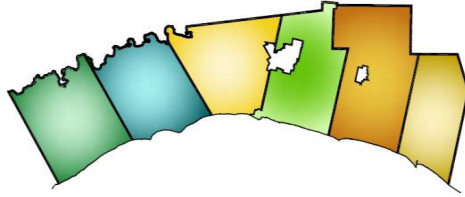

Dear Mayor Purcell and Municipality of Dutton Dunwich Council,

I write to you in my capacity as Chair of the Elgin Group Police Services Board (Elgin Group) to advise you that Elgin Group's contract with Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) expires on December 31st, 2022.

The new Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA) is set to come into effect soon, and all contracts will become null and void at that time. Instead of entering into a new contract with the Ministry at year's end, the Elgin Group Member Municipalities have the option of extending the current contract for a period of one (1) year.

To extend the contract, Member Municipalities will be required to pass a By-law to amend the Agreement and extend the contract until the 31st of December 2023. I have enclosed a draft copy of the Elgin Group Amending Agreement, as provided by OPP. Additionally, I have enclosed a draft By-law prepared by Elgin Group's Secretary Administrator and reviewed by the County's Solicitor. Upon review of the draft Agreement, each Council is required to pass the By-law to amend the Agreement.

Please send a copy of the By-law, signed by both the head of Council or presiding officer of the meeting at which the By-law is passed and the Clerk, under the Corporation's seal to Police Services Board Secretary Administrator – Carolyn Krahn (ckrahn@elgin.ca). Once each Member Municipality has passed the By-law, the Ministry will assemble the final copy of the Amending Agreement and will send it to the Member Municipalities for their signatures.

**"A BY-LAW TO AUTHORIZE THE MAYOR AND THE CLERK
TO EXECUTE AN AMENDING AGREEMENT WITH HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN
IN RIGHT OF ONTARIO AS REPRESENTED BY THE SOLICITOR GENERAL
FOR THE PROVISION OF POLICE SERVICES FOR THE
ELGIN GROUP MUNICIPALITIES"**

WHEREAS the Municipal Act, 2001 S.O, c.25, as amended, authorizes municipalities to enter into agreements; and

AND WHEREAS under Section 4(1) of the Police Services Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.15, municipalities are required to provide adequate and effective police services in accordance with its needs;

WHEREAS under Section 10 of the Police Services Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.15, the Solicitor General may enter into an agreement with the council of a municipality or jointly with the councils of two or more municipalities for the provision of police services for the municipality or municipalities by the Ontario Provincial Police;

AND WHEREAS under Section 29, the Parties may amend the Agreement by written agreement;

AND WHEREAS the Corporation of the Municipality of West Elgin, the Corporation of the Municipality of Bayham, the Corporation of the Municipality of the Township of Southwold, the Corporation of the Municipality of Central Elgin, the Corporation of the Municipality of Dutton Dunwich and the Corporation of the Municipality of the Township of Malahide (herein after collectively called the "Elgin Group") seek to enter into a single amending agreement for the provision of Police Services by the Ontario Provincial Police;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of _____ enacts as follows:

1. The Mayor and the Clerk are hereby authorized, on behalf of the Corporation of the Municipality/Township of _____ to enter into and execute under its corporate seal an agreement for the provision of Police Services with the Solicitor General of Ontario.
2. The Police Services agreement with the Solicitor General of Ontario shall also be authorized by the five other Municipalities, being the other members of the Elgin Group.
3. The Police Services amending agreement will commence on the 30th day of December, 2022 and will conclude on the 31st day of December, 2023.
4. A copy of said amending agreement shall remain attached to and form part of this by-law.
5. This By-law shall come into force and effect upon the final passing thereof.

HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN IN RIGHT OF ONTARIO AS REPRESENTED BY THE SOLICITOR GENERAL
(“Ontario”)

THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF WEST ELGIN
THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF BAYHAM
THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SOUTHWOLD
THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF CENTRAL ELGIN
THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF DUTTON/DUNWICH
THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MALAHIDE

(“the Elgin Group”)

BACKGROUND

- A. The Parties entered into the Agreement for the provision of Police Services under Section 10 of the *Police Services Act* (the “Agreement”) which commenced on the 1st day of January 2015.
- B. The Agreement includes all the Schedules and Appendices to the Agreement.
- C. Pursuant to Section 29, the Parties may amend the Agreement by written agreement.
- D. The Parties wish to further amend the Agreement as set out in this second Amending Agreement, by extending the duration of the contract to conclude on the 31st of December, 2023, as supported by:
 - Bylaw # ###, dated #####, 2022 of the Council of the Municipality of West Elgin (attached as Schedule “A-1”).
 - Bylaw # ####, dated #####, 2022 of the Council of the Municipality of Bayham (attached as Schedule “A-1”).
 - Bylaw # #####, dated #####, 2022 of the Council of the Township of Southwold (attached as Schedule “A-1”).
 - Bylaw # #####, dated #####, 2022 of the Council of the Municipality of Central Elgin (attached as Schedule “A-1”).
 - Bylaw # #####, dated #####, 2022 of the Council of the Municipality of Dutton Dunwich (attached as Schedule “A-1”).
 - Bylaw # #####, dated #####, 2022 of the Council of the Township of Malahide (attached as Schedule “A-1”).

NOW THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

1. Section 26 of the Agreement shall be replaced with the following:

26. Notwithstanding the date upon which this Agreement is signed, the term of this Agreement shall commence on the 1st day of January 2015, and shall conclude on the earlier of (i) the 31st day of December, 2023 or (ii) the date that the Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019 comes into force.

Relevant terms and conditions of the Agreement, that are not specifically amended but that relate to the amendments set out in this Amending Agreement shall be deemed to be amended so as to give effect to the changes herein.

Except for the amendments set out herein, the terms and conditions of the Agreement remain in full force and effect and time shall remain of the essence.

Notwithstanding the date upon which this Amending Agreement is signed, this Amending Agreement is effective as of the 30th day of December, 2022.
