# Meet the collector with hundreds of vintage bicycles

Part of Rick Wolfe's 200-bike collection is on display at the Elgin County Heritage Centre

on't ask Rick Wolfe which of the 200 vintage bicycles in his collection he likes the most. They're too varied, and he's spent too much time hunting them down and fixing them up to single out a favourite.

After decades of acquiring rare and wondrous machines – this one with an actual steering wheel, that one with a sinuous frame of steam-bent wood, this other one with a gear so huge the rider needed to be pushed into motion – he keeps looking, and keeps making oddball discoveries.

The basement of his home in Komoka, Ont., has a raised ceiling to accommodate the collection of them, which resides in climate-controlled security. His wife Marian has laid down the law: What happens in the basement is up to him, the upstairs is her domain.

The physical limitations of the basement restrict him somewhat. But he keeps acquiring, sometimes buying a whole collection of bikes and parts to secure one or two items. To preserve them in the country. To prevent them ending up in a dump.

"As a collector, you grow to the realization that ownership is only one-tenth," he said. "Basically you're a caretaker to these things. Because you know, we move on. Life takes us and they have to go to another."

Such personal collections teeter on that line between obsession and labour of love. And as television programs such as *Antiques Roadshow* joust for attention with reality shows about hoarders, they speak to a contemporary tension: While stuff has become a dirty word, some stuff is still worth keeping. They also recall a

concept known as the cabinet of curiosities. In previous centuries, wealthy people would display oddities and treasures, gathering whatever appealed to them. Some of these became the basis of modern museum collections.

But then, as now, collecting requires discernment. Anyone can accumulate whatever they like, and while it may mean a lot to them that doesn't make it meaningful. Mike Baker, the curator at the Elgin County Heritage Centre, where some of Mr. Wolfe's bicycles are on display, remembers a few instances of being approached by people and having to tell them gently that their treasured items lacked display value. The owner of a collection of 157 vintage creches was particularly put out. Mr. Wolfe's collection appears to fall on the safe side of the line. He points out that there are

vintage bicycles in the permanent collection of the Canadian Science and Technology Museum in Ottawa. And there was a 2012 show about the art and machines of cycling's early era at the Guggenheim's Venice outpost to add credibility to the pursuit.

They've been enough of a draw at the Elgin museum – Mr. Baker estimated attendance is up 50 per cent – that the exhibition was recently extended a few months, through the start of September.

The robust market for classic bicycles also speaks to their value. But Mr. Wolfe says he's not chasing a payout with his collecting, noting that restorations can take him years of unpaid labour. He's machined his own spokes for the wheels, cut his own leather for the saddle. He has an Amish connection in Ohio for making wooden wheel rims and bought the whole tire supply of a Dutch company going out of business.

"If you're getting into it for the money, you're going to be a poor man," he said, quoting a collector who helped mentor him. "I find it

fulfilling. Some guys want to sit and do crosswords. Some people shoot pool. I go to my workshop."

One gets the sense that if twowheelers had not been invented, Mr. Wolfe would have found something else to focus on. As a child he collected eigar boxes, admiring their designs. After leaving home as a teenager he earned extra money finding and selling antiquities. He eventually landed at Ford Motor Company, where he worked for decades as a painter, artist and detailer before retiring at 50. Somewhere along the way he fell in love with vintage bicycles and motorcycles.

Mr. Wolfe loves to talk about where he found his bikes - tobacco kilns come up with surprising regularity - or their niche in history, and tends to find a willing ear for his stories at dozens of bikes shows annually. In late May he showed off his riding chops at an event at the Elgin museum. He was on a high-wheel bike, one of those comical-looking yet dangerous 19th-century machines with a small back wheel and an enormous front one, garbed in a reproduction of the outfit worn by a local cycling club of the same

But he's now 66, and not as spry as he used to be. The time he rode 1,200 kilometres in seven days on a high wheel, dodging full beer cans thrown at him in New York State, is a trip that won't be repeated. He's aware of the sands slipping away. The antique bikes crowd tends to be as grey-haired as the opera set, so he'd love to nurture protégés who might con-tinue his life's passion. Some of his collection may end up in museums. But there needs to be a new generation as seized with saving and bringing back to life these old machines.

Mr. Wolfe recently tutored a younger man on how to put together a vintage high-wheel bike. It's not yet clear whether that achievement scratched an itch in the student, or ignited a passion.

"I'm waiting for a young person to come up behind me and grab the baton," he said.

**SUBJECT:** Installation of Oneida Settlement Story

Mural at Elgin County Heritage Centre

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

THAT County Council hereby approve the installation of an interpretive mural depicting the settlement story of Oneida Nation of the Thames on the exterior of the Elgin County Heritage Centre subject to the terms and conditions contained in the May 16, 2023 report titled Installation of Oneida Settlement Story Mural at Elgin County Heritage Centre.

#### INTRODUCTION:

This report seeks County Council's approval for the installation of a mural on the west-facing exterior wall of the Elgin County Heritage Centre which will depict the 1840 settlement journey of the Oneida Nation of the Thames, a journey that took them from upstate New York, across Lake Erie and through present-day Elgin County to lands on the Thames River.

### **DISCUSSION:**

The Department of Community and Cultural Services has established a strong working partnership in recent years with the Oneida Language & Cultural Centre. This was initially based on regular research visits by members of the Oneida community to the Archives and was elevated in 2019 when representatives of the Centre were invited to view the facilities and collections of both the Elgin County Museum and Elgin County Archives. This began a discussion on ways the two neighbouring communities can work more closely together on Indigenous programming and historical research. One outcome was Oneida's participation in the 'Museums of Elgin County Database' beginning in 2022 which is hosted by the County and directly supported by Museum staff. Another outcome is that the Manager of Museum and Archives provides regular curatorial support to the community. Furthermore, staff of Elgin County Library have recently begun to visit the community to promote library services to Oneida residents. All of these efforts are on-going.

A further opportunity to solidify this partnership now exists through a proposed mural project depicting Oneida's settlement story and the journey taken in 1840 to their

current location along the south bank of the Thames River which is directly adjacent to the Township of Southwold. A substantial part of this journey took place in Elgin County, emanating from Port Stanley and then northwards along Kettle Creek to the present location. This mural will provide an opportunity to make the public aware of this significant journey that intimately connects Oneida Nation of the Thames and Elgin County at a site located on a major tourism corridor.

The following are aspects of the proposed project:

- Attached is one depiction of the settlement journey previously produced by the Oneida Language & Cultural Centre which served as the initial inspiration behind the project and will act as the conceptual basis going forward.
- The mural will be 8 feet high and 16 feet wide and will be located on the west facing exterior wall of the Elgin County Heritage Centre (see attached photo).
   The preferred location is marked as "A" in the attached photo. This location is adjacent to a space already in use as a picnic area for the general public.
- Project specifications will be similar to those used for the installation of six murals across Elgin County as led by the Museum in 2021 and 2022 through funding received from the estate of Donna Vera Evans Bushell.
- The Oneida Language & Cultural Centre will enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the County and will then commission the artists involved. It is expected that at least two artists will act as a team on this project, both of whom are residents of Oneida.
- The mural will be painted on site at the Oneida Language & Cultural Centre on smaller panels which will then be mounted together at the Heritage Centre to achieve the cumulative mural size of 8 feet by 16 feet.
- The mural will hang for a minimum of five years and will then be extended year to year depending on its future condition.
- The museum will make visitors aware of the mural and provide additional material from the Oneida Language & Cultural Centre to interested persons.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

Total budget for this project is \$8,000 which includes the costs for artists' fees, materials, anti-graffiti coating and installation. These funds already exist in the Museum's 2023 operating budget through projects associated with the bequest received from the estate of Donna Vera Evans Bushell. No further County funds are required to proceed.

### LOCAL MUNICIPAL PARTNER IMPACT:

Completion of this project will further solidify relations with a key strategic partner along Elgin County's border and fits in well with the County's Indigenous outreach efforts. The Oneida Language & Cultural Centre will benefit by gaining free interpretive space at the Heritage Centre to bring awareness to their community's settlement story.

#### **COMMUNICATION REQUIREMENTS:**

Regular updates about the mural's development will be posted on the County's social media accounts. An unveiling ceremony involving representatives of the Oneida Nation of the Thames, County Council, the general public and local media will be planned upon completion.


### **CONCLUSION:**

Should Council approve this project, it is expected that the mural will be completed and installed by the end of 2023 with an unveiling ceremony to follow either during fall 2023 or spring 2024. The Elgin County Museum Advisory Committee, which has two representatives from Elgin County Council (Councillors Giguère and Hentz), will have an opportunity to provide input into this project as it progresses.

Members of the Advisory Committee,

I would like to voice my support for the creation of an exhibit honouring Dr. James W. Crane (1877-1959) in the Elgin County Museum. His contributions to the community and to conservation were truly ahead of his time.

Dr. Crane served as a doctor in Iona and Wallacetown, was a University of Western Ontario Professor and Dean of the Medical Centre. He purchased land and created a conservation woodlot in Iona Station, where in 1938, he planted over 7000 trees of 85 different species. His intention was to preserve this woodlot for generations of people to enjoy. He donated the lot to the University of Western Ontario, who later passed it to Elgin County to maintain as a conservation woodlot. In 1976, the woodlot again changed hands to the Lower Thames Conservation Authority who maintained the woodlot in memory of Dr. Crane.

In 1961, there was a cairn placed on this property with a brass plaque commemorating the conservation efforts of Dr. James Crane where it remained until recent years. Sadly, the woodlot changed ownership again in 2019 and has since been compromised, and the plaque has been removed.

I believe that the Elgin County Museum would be an excellent home for the recovered original plaque (if it can be recovered) or a new plaque in honour of Dr. James W. Crane. It is my understanding that the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Authority has confirmed that there is \$9000 available to create a memorial for Dr. Crane.

Mr. Jim Crane, great nephew to Dr. James Crane is a great source of information about the legacy of Dr. Crane and his contributions to Elgin County. He will be able to provide photographs and relevant documents for an exhibit.
